



# BINGLEY METHODIST CHURCH ANNUAL REPORTS 2009/10

## **Sunday Club**

Sunday Club meets each week, (except the second Sunday of the month), sharing in the service until after the second hymn. They then go upstairs for their own, more appropriate activities. We have a group of six children coming regularly - though not all every week! Their ages range from 3 - 12 years. Crèche facilities are always available for the under threes. The art work created by the children is often on display in Room 2. You are welcome to take a look. On the second Sunday - usually - we have Creative Worship or Liquid Church and on these occasions the children join with the rest of the congregation for the whole service. Child-friendly facilities are available in the Quiet Room should a parent/carer feel the need to take a child out of Church. They will still be able to hear the service.

## **Messy Church**

Everyone that is involved with Messy Church is thrilled that it is still going so well. We have 35 children on our books and although they don't all come each month we are averaging 21 each time. Messy Church is aimed at school age children, although younger brothers and sisters are welcome, together with a parent or grandparent who is responsible for the child/children while they are with us. There is a section for the toddlers with toys so the parents can help the older children with the activities. As the children arrive they go straight on to craft activities, and then go into the Quiet Room for a story. While that is happening the parents with the toddlers enjoy a drink and chat to each other. When the story is finished some activities need to be completed and then, depending on what time we have before the whole family enjoy a nourishing meal together, we may have time for the children to tell us their news. After tea the afternoon closes with a summary of the story, told by the children (which shows that they have listened), and closing prayers.

## **World Mission**

As you may know I took missions over from Rosalie in September last year with. Over Rosalie's last year 2008-2009 the church made £435.82 for world missions. I would like to thanks Rosalie for all her hard work with mission over the year. If you have a mission box the best way to give the box to me is to put it in my pigeon hole at church. ## **Community Centre**

The Community Centre started in 1984 with activities every day of the week except Friday and Sunday. Wednesday was the main day, open from 10 am to 4 pm when lunches were served at 12 noon. As I was still working I wasn't involved with the Centre until the year following, i.e. May 1985. One thing I can remember on a Wednesday lunchtime is just cooking 8 potatoes! Now it has grown and we do a larger selection of both hot and cold lunches and serve between 30 and 40 people between 12 noon and 1 o'clock. In December we make a full Christmas lunch for up to 50 customers which is very popular and apart from turkey and all the trimmings we serve crackers, mince pies, after dinner mints and a drink. We are a happy crowd every Wednesday, both customers and helpers. Everyone is welcome, not only church members. We also have a stall selling various things but mostly lemon cheese (home made and delicious marmalade (lemon and orange), books and jigsaws etc. At the moment we are selling chickens sitting (or laying) on a Cream Egg (these have been on sale every Easter since 1988). We did sell Greeting Cards from 1984 to 2004 but had to stop when there wasn't room for the card stand. In fact, as the lunches are getting more and more popular we will soon need a larger room!

The Methodist Church in Britain requires each individual church to complete a property report form each year. This is to ensure that our buildings are run safely, are well maintained and insured. We have to note the work that has been carried out and our plans for future maintenance.

Each year we have our general maintenance contracts for the servicing of the lift, the fire extinguishers, the gas boilers and window cleaning. The installation of the pressurisation unit for the boilers last Spring has made all the difference to the proper functioning of the boiler. Most of the rooms, stairways and corridors have been decorated and more recently the floors of the two halls have had their surfaces refurbished. Damaged slates on the roof have been repaired.

In the next few months we are hoping to make further improvements. During the summer holidays we are planning to have both halls decorated. In order to save lights being left on we are planning on having 'push button' type switches particularly in the cupboard type rooms.

For the tidy appearance of the church and grounds we have many people to thank:- 'The deputy caretakers', the people who mow, litter pick, dust, vacuum, garden, decorate and clean the toilets.

### **Treasurers Report**

I was appointed as Bingley's Church Treasurer at the June 2009 Church Council, so this is my first Treasurer's Report.

For the year ending to 31 August 2009, our income was £46,862 and our expenditure was £33,365. Major items of expenditure last year included £2,465 for our boiler service and upgrade, and £634 for repairs to the sound system.

These figures mean the accounts show a surplus for the year of £13,497. But included in this surplus was our donation of £612 to MRDF (25% of the 2009 Flower Festival proceeds) and provision for our "Holiday at Home" scheme. Also, we've recently had the hall floors re-varnished and are due to have the church redecorated: both of these large items of property expenditure will show on next year's accounts.

Generally speaking, income from the collections pays our Circuit Share, and income from lettings goes towards the running costs of our church building.
